## EVERYONE'S BUSINESS!

Maintaining livable neighborhoods requires the partnership and participation of all residents. The City of Lancaster codes are intended to benefit everyone while making our neighborhoods a better place to live, work and play. The City codes are minimum standards designed to protect the health, safety and welfare of our neighborhoods. Compliance with these standards can reduce vandalism, deter crime, maintain property values and prevent deterioration of our community

## Common Code Violations

### ILLEGAL DUMPING

Some examples include unauthorized use of dumpster; discarding trash and debris on another's property; or dumping left over construction materials on private or public properties.

### HIGH GRASS

Violation: Grass and weeds in excess of 12 inches between property lines and paved streets.

### INOPERABLE VEHICLES

Junked vehicles may not be located anywhere that is visible from a public place or public right-of-way.

### FENCES

All fences shall be maintained in good repair and structurally sound condition. Repair of fences require a building permit and inspection by the City of Lancaster.

You can report code violations or any other request to City staff 24 hours a day by going to the City of Lancaster website, **[www.lancaster-tx.com](http://www.lancaster-tx.com)** and click "**Report A Concern**". If you would like to be contacted by City staff regarding your concern, you will need to leave your name, contact number and/or an e-mail address.

## Program Facts:

- Work will be completed within 60 days of payment

- A 10% discount will be given to senior citizens age 62 and over

# STORMWATER

## Pollution Prevention

### When It Rains, It Drains

#### Understanding Stormwater

##### What is Stormwater?

Storm-water is water from precipitation that flows across the ground and pavement when it rains or when snow and ice melt. The water seeps into the ground or drains into what we call storm sewers. These are the drains you see on the street corners or at low points on the side of the streets. Collectively, the draining water is called storm-water runoff

##### What happens when it rains?

Rain is an important part of nature's water cycle, but there are times it can do more damage than good. Problems related to storm-water runoff can include:



Increase in spending on maintaining storm drains and the storm sewer system that becomes clogged with excessive amounts of trash and debris.



Flooding caused by too much storm water flowing over hardened surfaces such as roads and parking lots, instead of soaking into the ground.

#### Restoring rain's reputation:

##### What everyone can do to help

- 💧 Properly dispose of hazardous substances. Never pour them down any part of the storm sewer system.
- 💧 Use pesticides, fertilizers and herbicides properly and efficiently to prevent excess runoff.
- 💧 Report any discharges from storm water outfalls during times of dry weather.
- 💧 Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly. No matter where pets make a mess, in a back yard or at the park.

#### COMMON CONTAMINANTS IN POLLUTED RUNOFF

Everyday items we use inside and outside of our homes can become part of runoff pollution. Here are a few household items that need to be properly handled and disposed of, or they will become dangerous and damaging pollutants:



##### HOME

Detergents, cleaners and solvents  
Outdoor trash and litter  
Oil and latex paint  
Swimming pool chemicals



##### VEHICLE AND GARAGE

Oil and grease  
Cleaning chemicals  
Radiator fluids and antifreeze  
Bake pad dust



##### LAWN AND GARDEN

Pet and animal waste  
Clippings, leaves, and soil  
Pesticides and fertilizers

# LET'S GET SMART ABOUT WATER



## Four Tips to Help Conserve Water Indoors

- Turn off faucet while brushing teeth.
- Take shorter showers.
- Fix leaks in faucets, showerheads and toilets.
- Only wash full loads.

Water conservation has become more and more of an issue in recent years. Not only does it help save money, making a few changes to conserve water can benefit our planet tremendously.

Your home is your most important asset. Save money and protect it from potential water damage by checking for leaks in your toilets, faucets, showerheads etc.

## Leak Detection and Prevention

Water leaks are costly, and more common than you might think. Nearly 10% of homes have leaks wasting upwards of 90 gallons of water every day. Most water leaks are fixed easily, but if left unchecked can cost you 10% on your water bill.



## Use your water meter to check for leaks

1. Make sure no water is being used inside or outside of your house.
2. Locate your water meter and check the leak indicator to see if it is moving. ...
3. Or, you can also take a meter reading and wait 1 or 2 hours and take another meter reading (make sure no water is used during this time).

Hand watering and soaker hoses will be permitted at any time.**

As a City of Dallas wholesale water customer, the City of Lancaster is required to comply with the existing Drought Contingency Plan to address the future water demands that will impact our water supply. Water conservation measures are in place to facilitate a goal of a five percent (5%) reduction in water consumption. Residents are allowed to water twice a week according to this schedule. Watering is restricted between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.



## AFFORDABLE SPAY, NEUTER & SHOTS

Spay Neuter Network is bringing the Mobile Animal Surgery Hospital (MASH) and experienced vets to provide affordable care for dogs & cats.

**Dog spay/neuter is just \$50 - \$66 & cats are \$30 - \$42**

Proof of Rabies vaccination from a veterinarian required. Animals not vaccinated must receive Rabies shot with surgery (\$8.80). All dogs must receive a flea pill (\$2.20) before surgery and leave surgery with an E Collar (\$3.85). Appointment and \$20 deposit per animal required for surgery. Deposits are applied to your balance after surgery. Any remaining amount is refunded.

**How so low? Spay Neuter Network is a non-profit that uses grants and donations to cover the cost of quality vet services so everyone can afford to fix their pets.**

SNN will also provide affordable vaccines and wellness, with no appointment from 10am to Noon, including Rabies, Parvo/Distemper, Bordetella, Feline FVRCP combo shots, FeLV (Feline Leukemia), FeLV/FIV Test, Heartworm test/prevention and more.

Spay Neuter Network performs more than 17,000 surgeries yearly in DFW and surrounding areas preventing 250,000 plus unwanted animals each year.

# Beat the Summer Heat!



Summertime means more time for fun in the sun with friends, family and pets. Soaring summer temperatures put pets at risk for dehydration, sunburn, burned paw pads, heat exhaustion and heatstroke. The good news is these heat-related health problems can be prevented with a little knowledge, planning and precautions.

## Tips to protect your pet from summer heat...

1. Never, ever leave your pet alone in the car; cracking the windows open and parking in the shade have little effect on the vehicle's interior temperature.
2. Make sure your pet has unlimited access to fresh, cool water; add an ice cube occasionally;
3. Make sure your pet has access to shade or cool places to rest when outside;
4. Take walks during the cooler hours of the day;
5. When walking, try to stay off of hot surfaces (like asphalt) because it can burn your dog's paw. To check pavement heat before walking your pet, place your hand or bare foot on the surface for 10 seconds. If it's too hot for you, it's too hot for your pet.
6. If you think it's hot outside, it's even hotter for your pet – make sure your pet has a means of cooling off;
7. Keep your dog free of external parasites (fleas, ticks) and heartworms – consult your veterinarian about the best product for your pet;
8. Consider clipping or shaving dogs with long coats (talk to your veterinarian first to see if it's appropriate for your pet), and apply sunscreen to your dog's skin if she or he has a thin coat.

# RESIDENTIAL SOLID WASTE COLLECTION

## CURBSIDE BRUSH/BULKY WASTE COLLECTION

### ACCEPTABLE

- Washing machines/Dryers
- Water heaters
- Kitchen appliances
- Yard tools
- Furniture
- Bundled carpet in 4 ft. lengths
- Bagged leaves
- Refrigerators/Freezers (must be tagged certifying removal of refrigerant)

### PROHIBITED

- Commercial construction and remodeling debris (call CWD for estimate)
- Household hazardous waste (paint, motor oil, pool chemicals, etc.)
- Tires, batteries
- Propane tanks



**BULK TRASH** or heavy trash is picked up **EVERY OTHER MONTH** on even months (August, October, December....).

Please refer to map on the following page to find your service area and the chart to identify your bulk service week.

On odd months, residents may drop off up to 12 cubic yards at the CWD transfer station at the following address:

A copy of your current water bill is required. Charges will apply to volumes in excess of 12 cubic yards.

**All brush and bulk materials must be set out and ready for pick up by 7:00 a.m. the Monday of your collection week.**



**REGULAR TRASH** is picked up **ONCE** a week. All trash must be secured in bags within your GRAY cart.



**RECYCLING** is picked up **ONCE** a week with trash pickup. Everything with the **BLUE** cart must be recyclable materials.

If at any time you do not comply within the above mentioned guidelines, your address will be documented as NO PICK UP for that week's collection.

For efficient retrieval, place both trash (GRAY) and recycle (BLUE) carts with the handles towards the curb (see picture for proper cart placement).

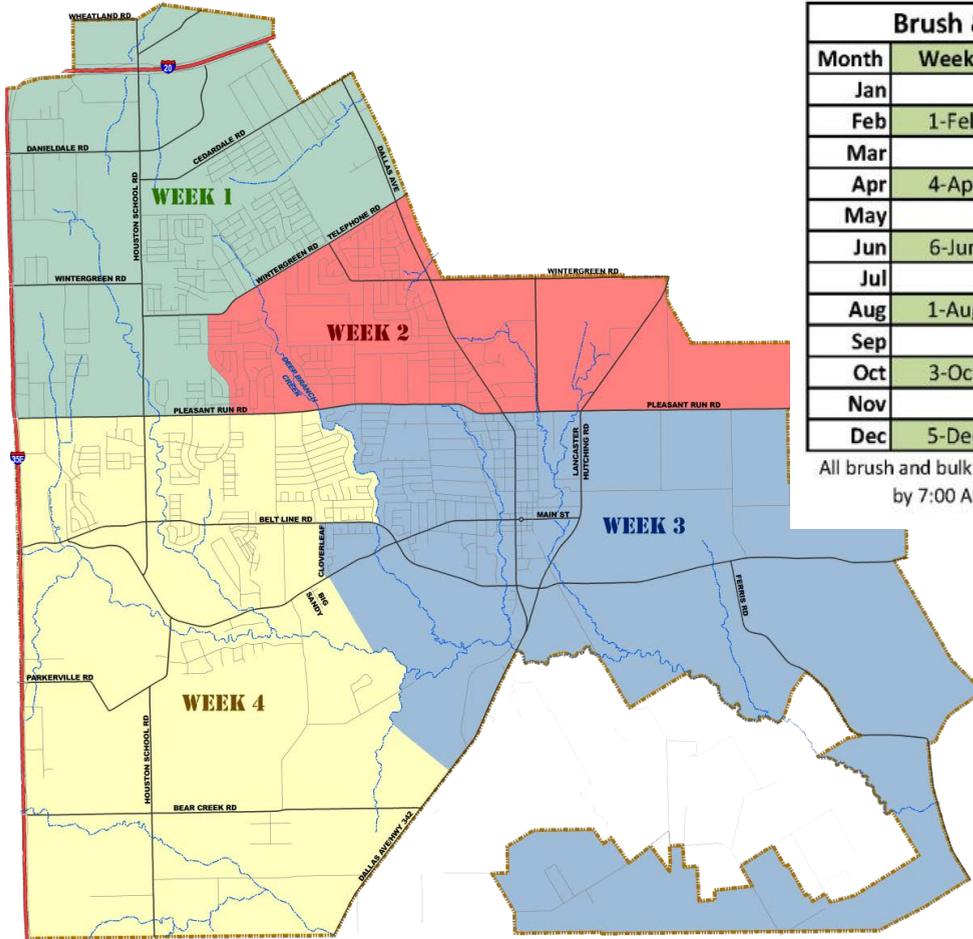
Place carts out by 7:00 a.m. for service between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

Household trash should be in disposable bags inside 95-gallon trash carts.

All items **MUST** be placed in carts.

Carts must be 3 ft. away from each other, 5 ft. away from any obstacles such as: mailboxes, car, fences, gas meters, or drainage ditches and a 16 ft. clearance above the carts.

# How to Protect Against Mosquito Bites



**Zika virus is spread to people mainly through the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes that spread Zika virus bite mostly during the day, but they can also bite at night. The best way to prevent Zika is to protect yourself from mosquito bites.**

## Use insect repellent

Use [Environmental Protection Agency \(EPA\)-registered](#) insect repellents with one of the following active ingredients: DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or para-menthane-diol. Always follow the product label instructions.

- ◆ When used as directed, these insect repellents are proven safe and effective even for women who are pregnant or breastfeeding.
- ◆ Reapply insect repellent as directed.
- ◆ Do not spray repellent on the skin under clothing.
- ◆ If you are also using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first.
- ◆ The effectiveness of non-EPA registered insect repellents, including some natural repellents, is not known.



## If you have a baby or child

- ◆ Do not use insect repellent on babies younger than 2 months old.
- ◆ Do not use products containing oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol on children younger than 3 years old.
- ◆ Dress your child in clothing that covers arms and legs.
- ◆ Cover crib, stroller, and baby carrier with mosquito netting.
- ◆ Do not apply insect repellent onto a child's hands, eyes, mouth, and any cut or irritated skin.
  - » Adults: Spray insect repellent onto your hands and then apply to a child's face.



## Treat clothes and gear

- ◆ Treat items such as clothing and gear with permethrin or buy permethrin-treated clothes and gear.
  - » See product information to find out the number of washings or length of time the protection will last.
  - » If treating items yourself, follow the product instructions.
  - » Do not use permethrin products directly on skin.

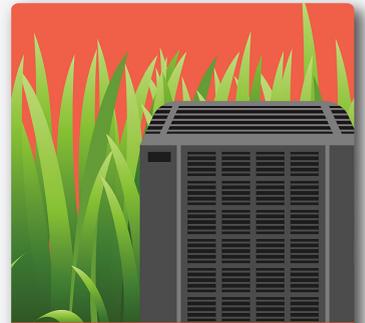
# SUMMER TIPS

## How to keep your home cool and save money



### Use a programmable thermostat.

Or adjust your thermostat during overnight hours or when no one is home. Try setting it to 78 degrees or warmer in the summer. Setting it to 7-10 degrees higher than you normally would for 8 hours a day can reduce energy consumption as much as 10 percent.



### Maintain your air conditioner.

A properly functioning air conditioner is an efficient one. Replace filters every month or two during the cooling season. And that big hunk of metal outside? That's the evaporator coil. It needs plenty of airflow, so clean it once a year. Remove debris and trim foliage too, leaving at least two feet of space around it.



### Install efficient lighting.

It runs cooler. Only about 10 percent of the electricity that incandescent lights consume results in light — the rest is turned into heat.

**You can take the burden off your air conditioner by using other methods to keep the heat down in your home.**



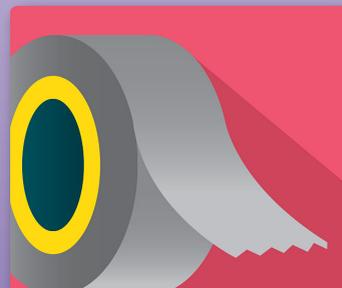
### Limit the heat from your appliances.

Cook outdoors on the grill, and try not to use the dishwasher, washer, and dryer during the heat of the day.



### Move lamps, TVs, and other appliances away from the thermostat.

The extra heat they produce can cause the air conditioner to run longer.



### Seal your heating and cooling ducts.

Leaky ducts can reduce your system's efficiency by as much as 20 percent. Start by sealing ducts that run through the attic, crawlspace, or garage using duct sealant or foil tape. Then wrap the ducts in insulation to keep them from getting hot.



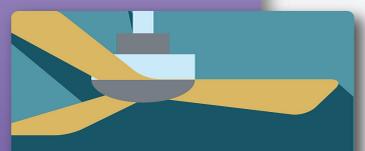
### Weatherize your home.

Find air leaks and seal them with caulk and weather stripping.



### Plant shade trees and install window blinds.

With less sunlight shining on your house, the internal temperature can decrease by three to six degrees in the summer and save up to 25 percent in cooling costs. Use energy-efficient window treatments and close them during the day to block direct sunlight.



### Use ceiling fans.

They circulate the air in the house and allow you to raise the thermostat setting about 4 degrees without discomfort.

### **What is the Lancaster Civic Leadership**

The Lancaster Civic Leadership Academy is an 8 week program that allows city residents and employees to learn more about the functions of city departments and services.

### **Who is eligible to participate?**

The Academy is open to all Lancaster City residents and employees 18 years of age or older.

### **How big are Academy classes?**

Class size is limited to 25 participants. Valid applications that are received after a class is full will be saved until the next Academy. Applicants who have had applications carried over will be contacted prior to applications becoming available and given the chance to enroll.

### **How much does it cost?**

The Academy is **FREE** of cost to you!

### **When is the Academy held?**

The Academy is held in the Fall. The 2016 Civic Leadership Academy will begin on September 15, 2016. Sessions last approximately two hours, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

### **What is the attendance requirement?**

Participants in the academy must attend 7 of the 9 sessions to receive a certificate. We recognize that our participants may experience conflicts over the course of the Academy Program. However, the city staff works very hard to make sure that participants get a comprehensive picture of the city operations. If more than two sessions are missed, this picture is not complete.

### **Why should I volunteer my time for this academy?**

While our citizens use city services every day, rarely do they see what happens "behind the scenes" or have access to information regarding why and how things happen. The Academy is a great way to find out more about how the City of Lancaster is working for you! Additionally, citizens who are considering or who may consider applying for an appointment to one of our many Boards and Commissions will gain insight into our departments and functions. The Academy offers Lancaster residents an in-depth look into City operations and services.



# 2016 Civic Leadership Academy

The Lancaster Civic Leadership Academy is a 9 week program that allows city residents to learn more about the functions of city departments and services "behind the scenes," allowing them access to information regarding how and why things happen. It is free to any city resident 18 years of age or older. The 2016 Civic Leadership Academy begins September 15, 2016 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. and continues every Thursday, with graduation on Monday, November 14, 2016. This challenge was a statewide competition in which Texas communities competed to see which communities can demonstrate the greatest commitment to healthy living!

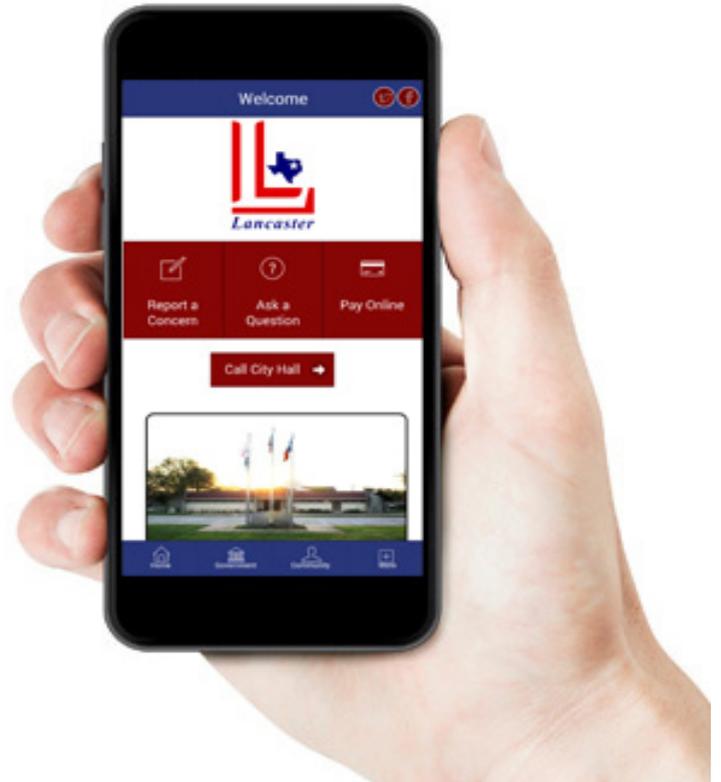
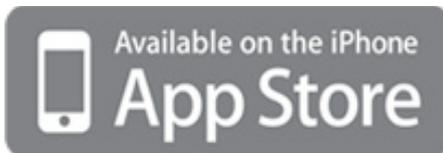

The Visitors Center, formerly known as the Interurban building, has welcomed visitors and businesses to our City for over one hundred years. Built in 1911, the Interurban Building was home to the Texas Interurban Railway that ran from Waxahachie through Red Oak, Lancaster, and Dallas to Sherman-Denison until the 1950s. It was also the region's first electric-powered building and where area residents' electricity bills were paid for more than 50 years. The Lancaster Visitors Center and City of Lancaster State Auxiliary Museum continue in this rich tradition.

In keeping with the history of the City of Lancaster and the Interurban Building, the City of Lancaster State Auxiliary Museum was established by the Texas legislature in May 2007 and introduced by State Representative Helen Giddings. The museum showcases the history of the State of Texas and educates patrons on the historical artifacts represented within the exhibit. This premier attraction serves as a unique resource for residents, educators and visitors of Texas alike.
