### **Candidate Packet**

*A **Candidate's packet** is available to help acquaint you with applicable requirements to run for office in the City's Municipal Election. The candidates' packet provides guidelines and forms needed to file for a place on the ballot, as well as a Campaign Finance Guide and other useful information regarding the May 14, 2011 municipal election. You may pick up a candidate's packet on or after January 7, 2011 from the City Secretary's office, at City Hall, 211 N. Henry Street, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.*

*All registered voters residing in Districts 2, 4 and 6 will have an opportunity to vote for a candidate in their respective District. Anyone not currently registered to vote has until April 14, 2011 to register in order to cast a ballot in the May election. Voter registration cards may be obtained at City Hall or the Lancaster Public Library.*

*Early voting for the May 14, 2011 election is scheduled by Dallas County and currently is posted to begin May 2, 2011 and end on May 10, 2011. On Election Day, Saturday, May 14, 2011 polls are open 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. for more information regarding voter registration and election information, citizens may visit the Dallas County Elections Department's web site at [www.dalcoelections.org](http://www.dalcoelections.org) or call 214-637-7937.*

**Filing for office...***The term of office for a councilmember is three years.*

*The first day to file for a place on the ballot is Monday, February 14, 2011. The deadline for filing for a place on the ballot is Monday, March 14, 2011 at 5:00 p.m. at the City Secretary's office located at 211 N. Henry.*

### **Qualifications**

*To qualify for the office of Councilmember, a candidate must:*

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- be a United States citizen;*
- be 18 years of age or older on the first day of the term to be filled at the election;*
- have not been determined mentally incompetent by a final judgment of a court;*
- have not been finally convicted of a felony from which the person has not been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disabilities;*
- be a qualified voter of the City; and*
- have or will have resided in the City of Lancaster, Texas, and the district for a period of one year prior to the date of the municipal election.*

## WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT

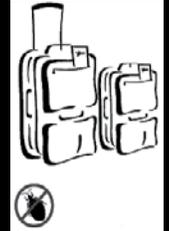
# BED BUGS

Any person can bring a bed bug home. These tiny insects most commonly are found wrecking havoc in homes, more specifically bedrooms where they have access to their source for meals; humans.



Bed bugs are small reddish-brown insects that are about the size of an apple seed. They hide in and around beds. Adult females lay up to five eggs a day in the crevices of mattresses and box springs and near baseboards. The eggs which have a sticky outercoat, hatch in about 4 to 12 days.

It takes about 5 to 10 minutes for a bed bug to take a full blood meal. Bed bugs don't carry diseases, but their bites can cause skin infections. The bites of a bed bug can be mistaken for a mosquito or flea bite, which can worsen the problems and delay the detection of an infestation. Some people may not show any symptoms of being bitten.



Aside from burrowing in the crevices of a mattress, bed bugs hide in nearby furniture, including night stands, dressers and headboards. Bringing secondhand furniture into your home should be avoided until it has been inspected for bed bugs. Adult bed bugs can survive for several months and can live long periods without feeding. Because bed bugs can infest furniture in other living areas, immediate action is recommended.



Travelers are cautioned and encouraged to change their behavior while they're away from home. Before checking into a hotel, travelers should keep their belongings away from the area around the bed and off the floor until a thorough check can be conducted.

Adult female bed bugs lay up to five eggs a day.

The feed-and-shed process repeats four times until the bed bug grows to the adult stage.

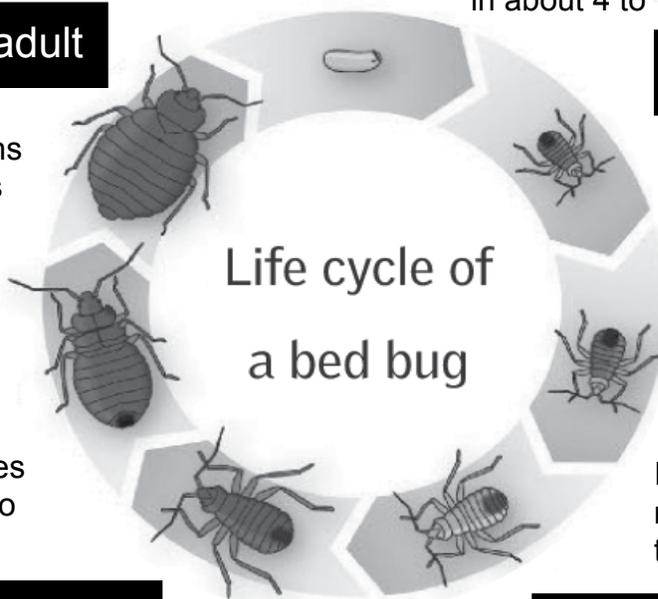
second stage

## A Safe Home is in Your Hands!

### Safety Steps for Wintry Weather

Winter brings bitter winds, icy paths and dipping temperatures. But perhaps the most chilling result of wintry weather is the marked increase in home injury during the season.

The Home Safety Council recommends following these simple steps to avoid potential dangers during the winter months:

### Carbon Monoxide Precaution: *Heating Systems and Gas Appliances*

- Install at least one smoke alarm and CO alarm on every level of your home and near sleeping areas.
- Have a trained professional inspect, clean and tune-up central heating system and repair leaks.
- Keep gas appliances properly adjusted and serviced.
- Avoid using a cooking stove to heat your home.
- Never use a gas grill inside your home or in a closed garage.

### House Fire Precautions: *Space Heaters*

- Turn off space heaters before leaving a room or going to sleep.
- Supervise children and pets at all times when a portable space heater is in use.
- Use proper fuel in kerosene space heaters.
- Avoid using space heaters to dry flammable items such as clothing or blankets.
- Keep all flammable objects at least three feet from space heaters.

### Home Fire Precautions: *Fireplaces and Wood Stoves*



- Burn only wood-not trash, cardboard boxes, or Christmas trees because these items increase the risk of uncontrolled fires.
- Check the chimneys you use regularly every year for cracks, blockages and leaks.
- Keep all persons and flammable objects, including wallpaper, bedding, clothing and pets, at least 36 inches away from fireplaces and wood stoves.
- Open flues when fireplaces are in use.
- Hire a professional sweep to clean your chimney at least once a year to prevent creosote build-up.

### Power Outage Precautions: *Lighting Sources and Perishable Food*

- Stock up on batteries, flashlights, portable radios, canned foods, manual can openers, bottle water and blankets.
- Use flashlights instead of candles to avoid a possible fire hazard.
- Run water at a trickle to help prevent pipes from freezing and bursting if outside temperatures are below freezing for an extended period of time and your home has no heat.
- Store perishable food outside in the snow or in an unheated outside building if power goes out.

## OVERHANGING LIMBS



*Time to get those trees into shape.* Trees, shrubs and other vegetation should not block a public sidewalk or hang any lower than 7 feet over the sidewalk. Limbs should not hang lower than 14 feet over a street or alley. Keeping your limbs to a minimum of 14' over the street will help keep our City fire trucks and trash service vehicles from being damaged when passing by. Most fire trucks are between 11-14 feet in height. Damage to the top and/or sides of these vehicles can be quite expensive. Take advantage of your FREE bulk pickup service by trimming the weekend prior to your week of bulk pickup.

## INOPERABLE VEHICLES

Vehicles within Lancaster City Limits must have current vehicle registration and current inspection tags to be on your property in public view or in the street. Vehicles that have flat tires, are wrecked or inoperable need to be repaired or removed from public view by being parked inside your garage. Vehicles without current registration and inspection are subject to removal and/or a citation being issued by Code Compliance. ## BULK TRASH

Please remember to check your bulk trash schedules before placing your bulk out for pickup. Items placed out at the wrong time are subject to a three day notice to remove and fees related to removal if still there after three day notice. Call 972-218-1300 if you have questions about the pick up dates for your address.

## PARKING ON UNIMPROVED SURFACE

Vehicles, including boats, campers, Trailers and RV's are to be parked on an approved parking surface. Not enough room to park all your vehicles? Contact Lancaster Building Inspections at 972-218-1200 for information about expanding or improving your driveway with an approved surface.



## GARAGE SALES

A permit is required to have a garage sale. Garage sales are allowed once every six months. Proof of Lancaster residency at the address you are having the garage sale at is required; however there is no cost for the permit. Permits are issued at the Building Inspections office located at 700 E. Main Street.

**What to do if you think you have been Exposed to Bed Bugs...**



Clothing and bedding should be washed in the highest temperature allowable that won't damage the fabric.



Luggage and other travel items should be kept from inside the home and wrapped in plastic bags until they can be checked for bed bugs.

Vacuuming, cleaning and clearing clutter may help diminish the problem, but consulting with a pest control provider is recommended.

**REMEMBER** it is often unnecessary to dispose of household items infested with bed bugs. Many items can be treated, encased or saved.

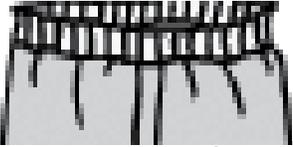

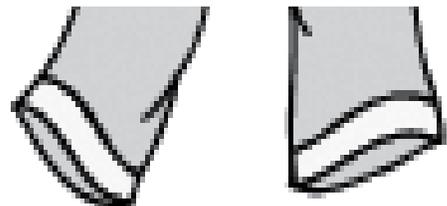

## Do you clean out your gutters?



Once the leaves fall, remove them and other debris from your home's gutters -- by hand, by scraper or spatula, and finally by a good hose rinse -- so that winter's rain and melting snow can drain.

Clogged drains can form ice dams, in which water backs up, freezes and causes water to seep into the house. As you're hosing out your gutters, look for leaks and misaligned pipes.

Also, make sure the downspouts are carrying water away from the house's foundation, where it could cause flooding or other water damage.

## How do I block those leaks of cold air from seeping in my house?



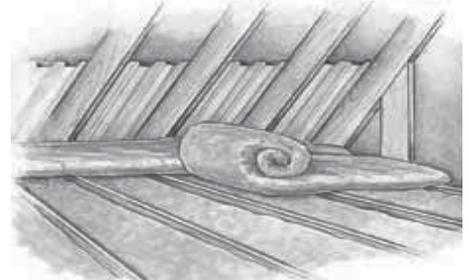
One of the best ways to winterize your home is to simply block obvious leaks around your house, both inside and out, experts say. First, find the leaks: On a breezy day, walk around inside holding a lit incense stick to the most common drafty areas: recessed lighting, window and door frames, electrical outlets.

Then, buy door sweeps to close spaces under exterior doors, and caulk or apply tacky rope caulk to those drafty spots. Outlet gaskets can easily be installed in electrical outlets that share a home's outer walls, where cold air often enters.

Outside, seal leaks with weather-resistant caulk. For brick areas, use masonry sealer, which will better stand up to freezing and thawing. Seal up small cracks too! "It also discourages any insects from entering your home."

## What about insulation?

"Another thing that does cost a little money -- but boy, you do get the money back quick -- is adding insulation to the existing insulation in the attic. A minimum of 12 inches is recommended.



If you go into the attic and you can see the ceiling joists you know you don't have enough, because a ceiling joist is at most 10 or 11 inches.

## Reverse that fan!



**By reversing the direction of your ceiling fan from the summer operation, the fan will push warm air downward and force it to recirculate, keeping you more comfortable.**

## Wrap those pipes

A burst pipe caused by a winter freeze is a nightmare. Prevent it before Jack Frost sets his grip: Before freezing nights hit, make certain that the water to your hose bibs is shut off inside your house (via a turnoff valve), and that the lines are drained.

Next, go looking for other pipes that aren't insulated, or that pass through unheated spaces -- pipes that run through crawlspaces, basements or garages. Wrap them with pre-molded foam rubber sleeves or fiberglass insulation, available at hardware stores. If you're really worried about a pipe freezing, you can first wrap it with heating tape, which is basically an electrical cord that emits heat.



## Get your ducts in a row

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, a home with central heating can lose up to 60% of its heated air before that air reaches the vents if duct work is not well-connected and insulated, or if it must travel through unheated spaces. That's a huge amount of wasted money, not to mention a chilly house.

Ducts aren't always easy to see, but you can often find them exposed in the attic, the basement and crawl spaces. Repair places where pipes are pinched, which impedes flow of heated air to the house, and fix gaps with a metal-backed tape.

Ducts also should be vacuumed once every few years, to clean out the abundant dust, animal hair and other gunk that can gather in them and cause respiratory problems.



## Face your windows

Now, of course, is the time to take down the window screens and put up storm windows, which provide an extra layer of protection and warmth for the home. Storm windows are particularly helpful if you have old, single-pane glass windows. But if you don't have storm windows, and your windows are leaky or drafty, you can buy a window insulator kit. Basically, the kit is plastic sheeting that's affixed to a window's interior with double-stick tape. A hair dryer is then used to shrink-wrap the sheeting onto the window. (It can be removed in the spring.) "It's temporary and it's not pretty, but it's inexpensive (about \$4 a window) and it's extremely effective."
